Major Points Discussed:

- Following the meeting's call to order, the event sponsor, EmCare, was acknowledged.
 The company's representative, Dr. Jenice Forde-Baker, shared a personal story about her path in emergency medicine.
- 2. Dr. Mary Westergaard, Section chair, presented the annual AAWEP awards. The winners were:
 - Resident Rocks Dr. Jamie Santistevan
 - Outstanding Mentor Dr. Kerryann Broderick
 - ED Director of the Year Dr. Kathleen Brown
 - Rising Star Dr. Ijeoma Ikunyili
 - In addition, the AAWEP section liaison, **Rachel Donihoo**, was presented with a special award for her contributions to the section.

3. The new AAWEP leaders for 2017 were announced: Drs. Elizabeth Lea Walters, councilor; Elizabeth Dubey, alternate councilor; Mary Ellen Lyon, junior resident representative, and Jane Yee, senior resident representative/newsletter editor.

4. Section Award and Grant Updates

- Dr. Mary Westergaard shared that the Section was selected to receive three awards this year.
 - The Outstanding Section Newsletter Award Dr. Jennifer Beck-Esmay spearheaded this effort and was thanked for her contributions.
 - The 2016 Service to Section Award Dr. Tracy Sanson was acknowledged for her role in earning this award, which recognizes a section that has provided excellent resources and educational offerings to its members.
 - The Outstanding Webpage Award Section liaison, Rachel Donihoo, was thanked for her role in creating and maintaining AAWEP's site and social media accounts.
- Dr. Lea Walters presented information regarding, "Working in Fours," a research
 project sponsored by a 2015 ACEP section grant. The study focuses on
 intergenerational communication between women in EM. The goal is to develop
 a downloadable leadership toolkit that could be used by female emergency
 physicians to bridge the divide between the four generations in the workplace:
 Veterans, Baby Boomers, Generation X, and Millennials.
- Dr. Lauren Walter solicited submissions for Women in Emergency Medicine a
 Perspective, a book of personal essays sponsored by a 2016 ACEP section grant.
 Men and women with a discerning anecdote or an inspirational or insightful
 story to share were encouraged to submit a short preliminary description to the
 project editors. Accepted submissions will be guided for expansion and inclusion
 in the book, which will be printed and distributed at ACP17. In the broadest
 sense, the section is seeking narratives regarding:
 - Leadership experiences
 - o Career changes and advancement
 - o Work-life balance
 - Wellness, burnout, and resiliency
 - o Career high and/or low points
 - Overcoming adversity
 - o Experiences in crisis and disaster
 - o The male perspective

5. Accomplishments and Opportunities

- Dr. Kathleen Clem presented a brief talk about AAWEP's LeaP initiative, a career development program designed to help exceptional members build critical skills while networking with mentors in the field.
- Dr. Lea Walters, AAWEP's councilor, reported on the decisions that were made at the ACEP16 council meeting. There were a wide variety of resolutions presented to the ACEP Board of Directors, ranging from diversity in EM leadership to court-ordered forensic evidence collection. Notably, Drs. Gillian Schmitz and Debra Perina were elected to the Board.
- 6. **Dr. Azita Hamedani** from the University of Wisconsin presented a lecture about sponsorship vs. mentorship titled "Can Women Be Mentored Past the Last Glass Ceiling?"
- 7. The AWAEM/AAWEP Joint Best Practices Task Force, as a follow up to a publication written by the group regarding moving the needle for women in emergency medicine, presented a special "Best Practices" session.
