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Emergency Medicine Organizations Call for End to Pediatric Merit Badges

East Lansing, MI (May 4, 2020)—The Coalition on Medical Merit Badges—an alliance including every major Emergency Medical organization—issued a signed statement that certification by the American Board of Emergency Medicine (ABEM) or the American Osteopathic Board of Emergency Medicine (AOBEM) precludes any short-course requirement such as Pediatric Advanced Life Support (PALS) or Advanced Pediatric Life Support (APLS) to care for pediatric patients in an emergency department. ABEM- or AOBEM-certified emergency physicians who are in good standing with their medical staff, and who are participating in a continuing certification program should be allowed to opt out of PALS and APLS courses. ABEM and AOBEM certify that the appropriate knowledge and skills have been acquired and are maintained through continuing certification. The full statement is available here.

The Coalition, formed in 2017, works to educate hospital stakeholders understand the extent of training and continuing education that board-certified physicians undertake to become and remain certified.
